Perinatology Services Cont.

Specialists in maternal-fetal medicine diagnose and treat problems of pregnancy, including medical problems in the mother (such as diabetes or heart conditions), complications of pregnancy, or problems developed by the unborn baby.

During a single visit, the Perinatologist can provide complete genetic counseling, Level II sonography, and if necessary, specialized procedures such as fetal echocardiograms, amniocentesis, etc.

Ten percent of pregnant women are considered high risk and require this highly-specialized help for themselves or their babies.

Dr. Beauchamp explains that multi-dimensional images are ultra-effective in diagnosing fetal birth defects, and high-quality ultrasound together with highly-trained sonographers are a must. She is glad to have both here at EIRMC.

In addition to diagnosing anomalies, Dr. Beauchamp also works with OB providers to prevent pre-term births. In cases of imminent pre-term delivery, an array of drug therapies are available to stop contractions and to help babies quickly gain lung maturity and strengthen blood vessels in the brain.

Hospital-based, Dr. Beauchamp is also available for phone and telemed consultations, which she says, "Is really great because women can deliver right where they are and not get on the road and travel." Always available to step in for advice and reassurance, she enjoys working in tandem, and leaving the long-term relationship between provider and patient intact.

Dr. Beauchamp points out that being here fulltime supports greater continuity of care, and that just makes patients and their doctors feel all the more comforted.

- Total care for patients with high-risk pregnancies.
- Consultation and recommendations for patients under the care of area OB/GYNs, midwives, or other healthcare
- Detailed ultrasounds for pregnant women (including the routine scan for low-risk women at 18-22 weeks).
- Amniocentesis
- Genetic counseling and prenatal diagnostic testing
- Preconception counseling to assess overall health, pregnancy-related risks, and recommendations to improve pregnancy outcomes.

Not Getting Lost in Translation

New computer-assisted captioning option for hearing impaired and ESL patients

Even when a physician's communication is crystal clear, sometimes patients and families have a tough time fully grasping unfamiliar medical concepts. Add to that a language barrier, and things get really complicated.

At EIRMC, services are available to ensure physicians have the ability to communicate with patients and their family members under most any circumstance. EIRMC's Communications Department offers an array of in-person, phone, and now computer-assisted translation services that are available 24/7.

The best translation resource is still the Language Line – always immediately available by handset or speaker phone.

Live translators are available for American Sign Language and Spanish, but since they are sometimes on-call

rather than on-site, in-person interpreters are not always the fastest option.



Quick Translation

To compensate, EIRMC has a new third translation option, called "CART," for computerassisted real time captioning. With a laptop and webcam, Internet-based translating services are available 24/7, for both sign language and Spanish. This is a great option when an on-site interpreter isn't available. This service doesn't replace Language Line or in-person translation, but is a great alternative when those services aren't a perfect fit.

To access any of our interpreter services, just contact the Charge Nurse, explain the assistance you need, and when you will need it. (Calling ahead before rounds to address known interpretation needs, for example, will lessen your wait time, and the patient's time, too.)

Language barriers can be difficult for physicians, patients and families, but EIRMC wants to provide the best environment for patients to receive the best care. And that's something we don't want to get lost in translation.

Mike Hunsaker, VP of Support Services, Star Valley Medical Center, writes:

Recently, an ATV accident trauma case came to our Emergency Department. A young woman was thrown from a side-by-side ATV while riding in the Palisades Reservoir mud flats near Alpine. She was transported to SVMC by the Alpine Ambulance Service and presented to trauma staff. Although she was still breathing, this young woman was non-responsive in every other way. A thorough examination including x-rays and CTs found facial and cranial fractures, and bleeding on the brain. She was transported immediately via helicopter to EIRMC.

EIRMC's Access Center was super helpful once the Trauma Team Physician determined that the patient needed to be transferred. Thanks to the immediate coordination and excellent care this young woman received at EIRMC, she is now home and well on her way to full recovery.

To just have to make one phone call to the Access Center and have all the details taken care of at the receiving end was great. Our trauma team has total confidence that the Access Center will take care of every detail in getting our patients safely to the EIRMC staff and the physicians that are waiting on the receiving end to take care of them and their loved ones when they arrive.
